From the Pastor's Study • August 2021

In just a couple of weeks a very small group of us will be heading north for a shortened week of wilderness canoeing. We've begun describing the trip as the "almost Canada" canoe trip – we'll be going into the Boundary Waters, a reminder of yet one more change caused by our world's current challenge of trying to navigate the best path forward in a continuing pandemic. We have been grieving our inability to embark on the trip to Canada due to border restrictions. We are grieving as we encounter the changes in outfitter, and menu, and restrictions for travel. At some point along our journey, we may be almost close enough to see Canada... but we won't get there this year. We are reminded that we are still journeying in that liminal space.

I have found myself repeatedly being drawn to the story of the Exodus as we've navigated the challenges of the last couple of years. The narrative can touch our journey of faith in lots of different ways – the theme that I keep hearing is that of moving from a people who are enslaved to the life-sucking-ways of being brick builders for Pharaoh, into being shaped into a people who are freed in order that they might learn to follow and serve God. That call to a different life orientation is at the heart of our story of faith. That call also constantly becomes one of the greatest challenges for any us as we journey with God. Like the Israelites, we are quick to proclaim the vision and value of freedom, but we are slow to embrace a vision that is about freedom for a path in service to something greater than ourselves and not merely freedom from a circumstance that we don't like. It's very easy to grieve change and complain about all the things that we don't like or don't have. It's much harder to turn to God and give thanks for what we do have and to keep our focus on the direction toward which God is leading us.

On that Exodus journey the people keep looking back and they keep grumbling and they keep doubting that they will arrive in the promised land. Indeed, their lack of faith, and their inability to work together with one another and with God at one point leads God to that proclamation in Number 14:11 that reads: "The Lord said to Moses, "How long will these people treat me with contempt? How long will they refuse to believe in me, in spite of all the signs I have performed among them?" God wants to wipe the slate clean and start over... but Moses convinces God not to give up on God's people. Perhaps you remember God's compromise, that the people would wander in the wilderness for forty years before arriving in that promised land. The people needed a generation to learn to work together and to trust in God... and even then it was often a struggle.

We are living amid a world that I think God might judge in very similar fashion to that whining, selfish generation in the wilderness. There's a desperate need for us to pull together, to work together, that we might choose to make meaning and strengthen our relationships with one another and with God during our wilderness journey. But that requires choosing a constructive attitude at every step along the way.

We're going to head into the wilderness with our little group, and I'm sure that there will be plenty of opportunities for us to whine about how our experience won't be like what we've had in the past... or, we can choose to encourage one another to celebrate a long awaited chance to engage God's creation with one another. We can choose to let our time and our journey feed our souls and deepen our relationship with God. Every time that we do something as a group we are reminded of how much more fun, powerful, and rewarding it is when we work together.

Around church lots of things are becoming re-energized. We are making plans for things like VBS, Sunday School, a Pignic, the Chancel Choir, Confirmation, Adult Faith Formation opportunities, and a Children's Christmas program all to be unfolding in the next few months. Even as we return to soulfeeding opportunities that seem familiar, they will be different. Lots of activities may shift their times in the schedule. One of the things that many of you have noted is that a year ago when we were

worshipping in the park on the first Sunday of each month that Communion shifted to the first Sunday instead of the last. By the end of the summer, we were talking about how much sense it made to align ourselves with most of the rest of our denomination and continue celebrating Communion on the first Sunday of the month. And so, we'll continue with that new schedule for the future.

My deep prayer is that as we continue this journey together, we all remember the power of working together. I also pray that we keep reminding ourselves and one another that our faith is about moving forward, and it is about humbling ourselves in loving God and loving our neighbor first and foremost. We are called to responsibility to all of God's people and creation. As a people of God, I pray that we can keep pulling together to bear witness to that freedom for which God has called us: the freedom to love like Jesus.

Updates from the Regathering Committee:

As a committee we agreed that we will continue following the guidelines of the CDC, the Wisconsin Department of Health Services, while using the local data generated by the County Health Department. Following these guidelines and our County Covid cases we find ourselves going back to 50% of capacity! (100 worshippers in the sanctuary, the worship leaders are in addition to that number). While this won't likely impact us during the summer, it is a reminder for us all to do our part and consider how we not only keep ourselves safe, but also our neighbors and especially the most vulnerable among us.

The new CDC guidance on masks removes all restrictions for those who are vaccinated. For people who are unvaccinated, per CDC guidelines, masks are required over the mouth and nose at all times, and social distancing of 6 feet remains. We are also now streaming all funeral services and posting those online.

PEACE UNITED CHURCH OF CHRIST ENDOWMENT FUND

ARTICLES

I. Peace United Church of Christ Endowment Fund:

Peace United Church of Christ, Kewaskum, WI, hereby establishes an Endowment Fund to receive and hold in perpetuity, financial gifts and bequests. The Endowment Fund provides a Christian opportunity for the donor to be forever remembered through the continuing work and efforts of Peace United Church of Christ's expression of love of God and God's Creation.

II. Administration:

- **A.** The Endowment Fund Committee: Under the direction of the Consistory, the Endowment Fund is to be administered by the Endowment Fund Committee.
 - 1. **Membership:** The Endowment Fund Committee shall consist of five (5) members of Peace United Church of Christ, to be appointed by the President of the congregation, with the approval of the Consistory at its organizational meeting.
 - 2. Terms of Office: The term of office for committee members shall be three (3) years, except beginning in 2006, when two (2) members shall be appointed for one (1) year, two (2) members for two (2) years, and one (1) member for three (3) years.
 - **3. Vacancy on the Committee:** In the event of a vacancy on the Committee prior to the expiration of a member's term, the President of the Congregation, with the approval of the Consistory, shall fill the vacancy.
 - **4. Term Limitations:** A member may serve no more than two (2) consecutive terms. One year shall elapse before being eligible for reappointment.
 - **5. Officers:** The committee shall elect it's own chairperson, vice-chairperson, and secretary/treasurer.

a. Duties of the Chairperson:

- (1.) Schedule the meetings of the Endowment Fund Committee semi-annually or as needed, to review the status of The Fund, and in a timely manner, advise the Consistory of the status of the principal balance of the Fund.
- (2.) Preside at all meetings of the Endowment Fund Committee to set goals, policies, and give direction.
- **(3.)** The chairperson or a designee shall report annually, or at other times, as requested by the Consistory, to the congregation on the status of the Endowment Fund.
- b. **Duties of the Vice-chairperson:** The vice-chairperson shall discharge the duties of the chairperson in the event of the chairperson's absence or disability.

c. **Duties of the Secretary/Treasurer:**

- (1.) Keep a book of minutes of all meetings of the Endowment Fund Committee, whether regular or special, the names of those present and absent, and the proceedings thereof.
- (2.) Acknowledge all special gifts and bequests to the fund. Instruct the Treasurer of the church invest the gifts according to the Investment Policy of Peace United Church of Christ as adopted in October 2013.
- (3.) Subject to the Endowment Fund Committee approval, instruct the Treasurer of the church, in January of each year, transfer ninety (90) percent of the earnings currently held in the Endowment Fund, to the General Fund of the church. The remaining ten (10) percent of the earnings shall be added to the principal of the Endowment Fund.
- **6. Quorum:** Three (3) committee members shall constitute a guorum.
- 7. **Personal Benefit:** No person serving on the committee shall profit personally, or through any business entity with which they may be involved, as a result of any action made by the committee.
- **8. Audits:** On an annual basis the Consistory shall provide for a full audit prepared balance sheet and financial statement of the Endowment Fund, prepared by the chairperson or his/her designee.
- **9. Fidelity Bond coverage:** The Consistory shall provide adequate fidelity bond for the activities performed in good faith by individual members of the Endowment Fund Committee, or by the committee as a whole.

B. Duties of the Endowment Fund Committee:

- 1. To determine, implement, and review procedures and policies for soliciting funds.
- 2. To continually educate the congregation about the merits of the fund and its proper use.
- **3.** To adopt and implement strategies that promote giving to the fund.
- 4. To implement guidelines for the acceptance and recognition of gifts and bequests.
- **5.** To meet at least semi-annually to review the percentage of earnings to transfer to the General Fund of the church for dispersal.

III. Use of Principal and Earnings of the Endowment Fund:

A. Objective of the Endowment Fund: The objective of the Endowment Fund is to preserve the principal and use ONLY the earnings from the investment of the principal. Borrowing of principal funds shall NOT BE ALLOWED.

- Only in extreme and overwhelming circumstances, bordering on the survival of the church itself, may any or the entire principal be withdrawn.
- **B.** The principal of the fund shall be defined as the original gift or bequest, any additional gifts or bequests, plus any retained earnings as designated by the Endowment Fund Committee and approved by the Consistory.
- **C.** Earnings of the fund shall be defined as the portion of the earnings on the pooled investments of the church, assigned to the Endowment Fund balance, as stated in the Investment Policy of Peace United Church of Christ, adopted in October 2013.
- **D.** Authorization of allocations: The Consistory of Peace United Church of Christ shall have final authorization for all allocations for use of the earnings from the Endowment Fund, as recommended by the Endowment Fund Committee.

E. Distribution of Earnings:

- Earnings from the fund may be distributed for uses that benefit the church and its program provided such use is within the purpose of the Endowment Fund, and in keeping with the social principles of Peace United Church of Christ
- 2. Earnings from the Endowment Fund may be distributed by the Consistory as monetary gifts to support the programs of local not for profit organizations or to support the missions and ministry of Peace United Church of Christ.

IV. Continuance of the perpetuity of Peace United Church of Christ Endowment Fund:

- A. Church Merger: If, in the future, Peace United Church of Christ would merge with one or more churches to form a new congregation, the net assets of Peace United Church of Christ Endowment Fund shall be assigned to the newly merged church, and there it shall continue to exist exclusively for the purpose of benefiting the merged church, and performing the functions of these adopted articles of the Peace United Church of Christ Endowment Fund.
- **B.** Dissolving of the Church: If at any time Peace United Church of Christ should be abandoned or dissolved without a lawful successor thereto, the Consistory shall provide for an orderly assignment of the net assets remaining in the Peace United Church of Christ Endowment Fund to the Endowment Fund of the Wisconsin Conference, United Church of Christ.

V. Amendments of these Articles:

- **A.** These articles may be amended by the membership of Peace United Church of Christ, or its successor, provided however, that no amendment shall substantially change the intent and purpose of these articles.
- **B.** The passage of an amendment shall require an affirmative vote of seventy-five (75) percent majority of the Peace United Church of Christ <u>members present</u> at any regular or special meeting of the Congregation, provided that full presentation of such proposed amendments shall have been published in the notice for such meeting, as provided in the Peace United Church of Christ constitution and by-laws.

Definitions:

Principal - The total amount of all gifts and/or bequests, **plus** any retained earnings at the end of each year, designated by the Endowment Committee and approved by the Consistory, to be added to the Principal.

Earnings - The portion of interest, dividends, and realized capital gains or losses from the pooled investments of the church. The portion received is determined by the month end balances of all accounts/funds of the church deemed to share in the investment earnings by vote of the Consistory.
