From the Pastor's Study • December 2022/January 2023

Ready or not, here it comes! Most years the race toward Christmas sneaks up on me just as I am settling in to enjoy fall. This year is no different. We are graced with the second snow of the year - that first one was so amazing coating the leaves while they still hung on the trees, and now the beauty of this day is snow clinging resiliently to the branches. Ready or not... This year, to fit in all of the lessons for Sunday School, they began talking about the arrival of the Magi two weeks before Thanksgiving, and we all got to hear about it in the children's sermon with an Aussie camel guest. Here it comes... Each year, as I am startled by the season and unprepared for the rapid approach of the holidays, I'm reminded of how God's story is always supposed to be startling.

As a child, I think I heard the Advent, Christmas, and Epiphany stories as wondrous, but I'm pretty sure I never thought of them as startling. The tale of a little child born in a manger always evokes that warm cozy feel-good story that is cloaked in candlelight services and singing "Silent Night." Those are wonderful experiences of the wonder of God choosing us. Still, what I've come to so clearly understand as the years have gone on is that the tenderness of God arriving in that unexpected infant-package in Bethlehem so long ago is also a radical proclamation of a totally different way of being in the world. Jesus' birth sets in motion a wild cascade of events that ought to challenge everything that we see in the world. Jesus was declaring that the way the world valued people and related to God wasn't aligned to God's values. He kept not only teaching but also living a way of love that really upset the status-quo. It challenged the ways that people had always done things before. Instead of focusing on power and institutions, Jesus focused on people and healing. Instead of focusing on amassing wealth or prestige, Jesus kept offering examples of humility and generosity. It's a crazy idea — an idea today often gets dismissed as socialist, or anti-American, or impractical, or who knows what. But this was the startling way of Jesus' birth and life. It was as though he was crying out the world "wake up!" with every fiber in his being. Be awake to the ways that God's love and truth and grace are to be lived as gifts instead of held onto as limited possessions which some chosen few have deservedly received.

Marty Haugen in his 1983 hymn proclaims:

Awake! Awake and greet the new morn, for angels herald its dawning. sing out your joy, for Jesus is born, behold! the Child of our longing. Come as a baby weak and poor, to bring all hearts together, to open wide the heavenly door, and lives now inside us forever.

Each year I pray that God's choosing to be born among us breaks us open in new ways so that we will never be the same. Every pregnancy and birth touches the family involved in indelible ways — Jesus' entry into the world should be no different. But the changes that

Jesus offers seek to introduce us to a different way of relating to God- and that is rooted in a thousand small decisions that would place God's love, and not the ways of the world, first. We still choose between the kingdom of God that we pray for, and the kingdom of Caesar into which Jesus was born.

How do we encourage love and generosity to change our lives? God wants us awake to greet the new morn with every moment of every day – to see how our choices impact for good or for ill, for benefit or detriment. We are to wake up and see the world through fresh eyes filled with God's wonder and revelation.

This January we will have the opportunity to welcome into our congregation for the year a fresh voice and new perspective in ministry. We will be welcoming a German pastor, Jakob, who will be serving a Vicariate year (an internship year) with us. I'm looking forward to a different theological training and a different perspective. I'm looking very forward to seeing how another minister in our midst might encourage each of us to be startled with new insights about how God's love is at work among us. Of course, I've always delighted in seeing you as a congregation so beautifully embody God's love in welcoming, supporting, and encouraging those among us to serve God. In many ways, "ready or not," we will have another experience and person shaping the next chapter in the story of Peace Church. Ready or not, here it comes — a holiday season, a new year, a new adventure in which we are always invited to see God embodied in all that surrounds us.

What is an Endowment?

The term endowment has been defined as "to enrich and provide an income." The Endowment Fund is made up of monies in which the principal cannot be spent. The Endowment is pooled with all the cash assets of the church and invested per the church Investment Policy. The earnings from the Endowment Fund are a resource to help ensure continued growth of the vision and ministries of Peace United Church of Christ.

How is an Endowment Funded?

Funding for an endowment is traditionally done through planned giving, though anyone can contribute with a gift of any size at any time.

What is Planned Giving? Planned Giving is a carefully considered way of giving one's accumulated, inherited and/or appreciated resources for support and perpetuation of the church's mission. The gift may be a direct gift or a deferred gift. Direct gifts are given directly to the Endowment Fund usually in the form of cash and/or securities. Deferred gifts are promised during the lifetime of the donor, but receipt of the assets is deferred until a later date through Wills (bequests), Charitable Remainder Trusts, and Charitable Gift Annuities. These gifts can be either designated or undesignated, ie., given with or without a specific purpose. The Endowment Fund encourages undesignated gifts and bequests. Designated gifts will be placed in the Memorial Fund.

What about my regular church giving? Giving to the Endowment Fund should not replace your regular church giving. Annual stewardship supports the current work of the church.

Where is the Endowment Fund invested? The Endowment Fund will be responsibly managed and invested along with the remainder of the church's financial assets by the investment committee in conjunction with a reputable "Wealth Management" company.

Can the Endowment Fund be funded in other ways?

While Planned Giving is the traditional way to fund an endowment, weekly, monthly, annual and one-time gifts to the Endowment Fund are also encouraged.

How do I get started?

If you think a direct or deferred gift is something that is right for you, the first step is to consult your tax or legal representative who has the knowledge and experience to guide you through the process. Or you can call the church office at 262-626-4011 and a representative of the Endowment Committee will contact you.

What are some examples of deferred gifts? BEOUESTS

Funds left to Peace United Church of Christ via a will.

LIFE INSURANCE

A current cash value policy can be gifted to the Endowment Fund, or the beneficiary of a policy can be changed to the Endowment Fund.

CHARITABLE REMAINDER TRUST (CRT)

A gift is made to the CRT, which purchases an income-producing investment. The donor is paid a monthly income, typically for a set period of time (usual for the life of the donor). At the end of the trust period, the balance of the investment is transferred to the Endowment Fund.

CHARITABLE GIFT ANNUITIES

An asset is donated to the Endowment Fund. In exchange for the gift, the Endowment Fund pays a fixed income to the donor for a specified period of time (usually the life of the donor). A portion of these payments is usually tax-free. At the end of the annuity period, the balance of the annuity is placed in the Endowment Fund

Our gifts of gratitude and love bring hope to the hopeless, joy to the sorrowful, and deep love to those who have ministered in God's love for so long. By giving generously to the Christmas Fund, we will help retired clergy, church staff, and their families to pay bills, maintain health insurance, and meet emergency needs. Year after year, our gifts make a difference, easing the anxiety of constant financial worries.

Last year, the Christmas Fund, administered by the Pension Boards of the United Church of Christ, provided over \$1.6 million in pension and health benefits supplementation, emergency grants, and thank-you checks to retired servants of the church and their families. Every cent of that money came from the pockets of people like you. Please give as generously as you are able this year!

In 2021, gifts to the Christmas Fund enabled:

- Monthly pension supplementation for 231 retired clergy and lay employees (\$1,104,479)
- Health benefits supplementation for 87 retired clergy and lay employees (\$177,600)
- Emergency grants for 53 individuals and families (\$150,338)
- Christmas "Thank You" gift checks to 509 retired clergy and lay employees (\$254,000)

Meeting opened at 5:33 pm with a prayer offered by Kathy Charland.

Discussion around the budgeted salaries for next year. Motion made by Becky to provide Robin with an additional week of vacation, putting her at 3 weeks of vacation for 2023 as well as a one-time gift of another week of vacation to be used within the 2023 calendar year. 2nd made by Clark Pearson. Motion carried.

Approval of Agenda with the motion coming from Kathy Charland with a second from Vance. Motion carried

Approval of Minutes from prior month with the motion coming from Tom Kolb and a second by Paul Behring. Motion carried.

Financial report provided by Tom Kolb. General fund giving is down by \$6,000. Motion made by Melissa to file the treasurer's report with a second from Kathy. Motion carried.

Motion made by Clark to approve the budget for 2023 minus the 5% increase to OCWM (\$1,712). 2nd made by Lisa. Motion carried.

Based upon the congregation's approval of the roof updates, a check is being cut this week to begin the project.

Conference reached out to Pastor with a unique opportunity for us to host an Associate Pastor from Germany. His church in Germany would be responsible for his salary and we would be responsible for his housing and travel. May have an opportunity to rent the apartment at Cedar Valley. Clark made a motion to pursue this opportunity, with a second coming from Becky. Further discussion took place. Motion carried with one abstaining.

Becky made a motion to designate Christmas offerings to the following with 50% to Hurricane Relief, 25% to the Full Shelf Food Pantry in West Bend, and 25% to the Kewaskum Food Pantry. Second made by Lisa. Motion carried.

Looking to fill 4 positions on the consistory with Tom, John, Martha and Karen's terms being up. Some people have potentially come forward but we still need to think about others who may be interested.

Kathy discussed having a volunteer appreciation day (Dec 4th) to celebrate all the wonderful volunteers in our midst.

Clark called to end the meeting and Pastor offered prayer ending with the Lord's Prayer at 7:10pm.

Job Opening at Peace Church - Peace Church is seeking to hire a person for part time weekly custodial and general cleaning duties immediately. This position will begin at up to 8 hours per week (interim period from now through approximately March 30, 2023) assisting the current church part-time custodian. Following this interim period, if the candidate selected for this position has a positive performance review with the Peace Church Personnel Committee, the position could grow to approx. 16-20 hours per week as this person would take over all the church custodial duties upon the springtime (approx.) retirement of the current custodian.

During this interim period of up to 8 hours per week, the specific duties of this new position will include all cleaning of the two church restrooms, kitchen (general cleaning only – specific kitchen cleaning will occur after each use by the responsible church members who are using the facility), Fellowship Hall and small vestibule area and steps between the women's restroom, kitchen, and Fellowship Hall.

This position requires a person who is self-motivated, can work on their own, maintain a work schedule and be flexible to various church needs. This person will also need to work in harmony with the existing part-time church custodian who will be maintaining the remainder of the church building outside of this position's responsibilities. This position at a minimum requires the part-time custodian to bend, reach, kneel, scrub (rest room floors, partitions, sinks/countertops – minimum of twice monthly), vacuum, mop, sweep, wipe down walls, cabinets, tables, etc. and to move tables & chairs (in Fellowship Hall) as needed to support cleaning duties. This position will require that the part time custodian use existing church cleaning agent that are being used by the current custodian.

The hours worked would be split between two cleaning days of Mondays and either Thursday or Friday. This would ensure that the areas of this position's responsibility get cleaned on Monday after the Sunday church services and again later in the week in preparation for the following Sunday services.

Additional hours may be required in the event of special church events (funeral, wedding, church dinner, etc.).

The employee will need to communicate with the Church Office Manager / Pastor / Personnel Committee regarding specific needs, concerns, issues, etc. as needed.
