

## From the Pastor's Study • February 2020

"Love like Jesus" Those were the simple words on the homepage of Faith UCC outside of Indianapolis. That simple phrase encouraged me to reach out to them for a place to stay on the way home from our recent Habitat trip to Mobile, Alabama. Our group of six young adults (and two not quite so young adults) had decided that we wanted to push a little farther north on our first day of driving home, and so we were once again looking for last minute floor space in a church. As has happened so often, the request was greeted with a simple but warm welcome. Each time this happens it becomes the simple affirmation of the kind of welcome that Jesus calls us to offer always. It's easy to talk about Jesus' miracles in ways that overlook the glimmers that we get of his simply offering hospitality. companionship, and teaching, in simple and humble ways at each moment of each day. I've often been challenged by the words of scripture that are offered in Matthew twenty-five when Jesus teaches "when you did it to one of the least of these, you did it to me." A glass of water, a visit, a little food, clothing, or shelter... that simple parable has so often given me pause when I've encountered the needs of the world. It can make the task of loving like Jesus overwhelming, for the needs are always greater than our capacity. But sometimes that simplicity also reminds me that our call to mission finds life in the simple and humble serving in whatever way is needed, with whatever we may be able to offer. This mission trip offered that kind of humble reminder. Only once in our five days of work did we continue a task that we had begun earlier. Instead, our jobs for the week were a variety of things that felt like the local Habitat affiliates' checking off their hadn't-quite-gotten-around-to-it list. We painted some offices one day and then the next day supervised sixty football players painting three homes for a two-hour photo-op. We cleaned up garbage and then finished the last little touch-up on another home that they'd hoped to have a family move into before Christmas. And we did a handful of odd jobs around the affiliate's massive Restore. More typically on these trips we are given a single larger task that we work on for a week and get to see progress, sometimes even miraculous. But this trip we got to celebrate lots of little accomplishments. We felt that it was time well spent and certainly a benefit to the affiliate in their mission to provide decent housing to all of God's children. This trip we got to see the power of mission offered in the accumulation of little tasks. We were reminded again that to love like Jesus is to treat everything that we do as an opportunity to shine with God's light. Humble service and opportunities large and small are the heartbeat of faith.

I often have people comment that we are a strongly mission oriented church. I'm sometimes a little taken aback at that comment because I tend to think that there is lots more that we could be doing. We certainly support three Habitat trips a year, and we steadily support a strong breadth of ministries near and far... but it always feels like we could do more. And yet I also humbly agree that the people of our congregation do a remarkable job of engaging in all kinds of mission in so much of what they do. And when an idea emerges from among us, the church seeks to embrace it.

We heard a story not unlike that in the Episcopal Church of the Redeemer which hosted us in Mobile. It was a 9-year-old girl who loved her church and pronounced one day that they needed to use their building and resources more. She proposed a community meal that would welcome in anyone who was looking for a home-cooked meal. One of the adults in the congregation heard her and worked with her to put a proposal together to present to Church leadership. For the last three years that church has served a weekly meal to the lonely, the hungry, those who are food-insecure, and those who just want to gather and be church. That young girl, her friends, and others even wait on everyone who comes and serves them at their tables. We got to experience their hospitality and their gumbo.

We have just entered the season of Epiphany when we proclaim that we have come to see the good news that God has offered us in Jesus. We are reminded of God's calling us to shine God's light into the world and to love like Jesus, in simple, humble, inclusive ways. "Just as I have loved you, you should love each other." – John 13:34

#### Message from Our Covenanted Partner in Ministry, Rev. Gretchen Martin

"Happy New Year!" This is likely the most common phrase or greeting shared in January. But, believe it or not, not everyone is having a happy January. For some, the holidays were a very difficult time of year. Whether it was the first holiday without a loved one or has been several years since this loss, emotions of grief, sadness, and regret can stir in us during the holidays. We grieve the things we can't share with our loved one; things like grandpa missing baby's first Christmas or the first holiday photos without the beloved child. We miss having grandma's favorite holiday treats or hearing our uncle's silly stories. And sometimes we regret or lament the fact that divorce has changed the holiday traditions. I think most of us are aware of these feelings and recognize that the holidays can be difficult for those in the wake of loss.

Now that the holidays are over, some folks may be feeling the January blues. The "mandatory cheer, cooking, visitors, glitz, glitter, toys and chores are over." A sense of sadness and loneliness can be unexpected and hit us hard. This is a very common experience as the hustle and bustle of the holidays are over and the darkness and slowness of January sinks in. Linda Walter, a licensed clinical social worker, suggests there are several reasons for the post-holiday or January blues.<sup>2</sup>

- 1. A change in your social calendar with a sudden lack of social events to go to can lead to loneliness, boredom, and a feeling of isolation.
- 2. After being with family and friends over the holiday, we may miss them terribly when they have all gone home.
- 3. Loss from death, divorce, or distance can make us feel like we're going through the mourning process all over again during the holidays.
- 4. January is a dark, cold month, where people tend to stay at home.
- 5. After lots of holiday travel, fatigue can cause us to feel run down and bring on sadness.
- 6. If you took time off during the holidays to rest and relax, when you return to work you may find a pile of work to get through that can seem overwhelming.
- 7. You may have overindulged in food and/or drink during the holidays and now, when you get on the scale, you feel guilty or frustrated.
- 8. Perhaps you're disappointed by the holidays. It wasn't what you had hoped for and now feel let down that they're over.

If this is how you are feeling, you are not alone. I have personally felt some of the January blues this year. My calendar went from packed to "zip" and I'm still caught off-guard since divorce has changed our family traditions. This year I also took a long, rejuvenating break for Christmas and the New Year, but the amount of work I came back to seemed insurmountable. I have found that scheduling a movie and time with friends and making a detailed to-do list is helping me get through January.

What can you implement to shake off the January blues? Take time to talk with friends or family about how you are feeling. Get a few things on the calendar that you can look forward to, lunch with friends, a FaceTime date with your grandchildren, or even joining a book or Bible study. Take care of your health by eating well, exercising, and getting enough sleep. Also give yourself grace and patience as you work through the January blues.
