From the Pastor's Study • November 2020

The other day I cringed as I read an email encouraging clergy to maintain a non-anxious presence as we continue through these challenging times. It was hard to read those words knowing that I have been feeling emotionally as strained as any of those around me. The other day I heard a difficult word about a friend and could only describe my emotional state as brittle. I keep hearing those same sentiments from so many as we navigate a moment in time where politics, economics, and pandemic get overlaid on all the normal rhythm of life. These are times when it is easy to feel anxious, exhausted, even brittle... but they are also times when we can allow those same emotions to center us down into the depths of our faith.

I was reading a description of two very different theologians, N.T. Wright and Walter Brueggemann, writing about the pandemic and both turning to the language of lament that appears in scripture as the starting point for turning to God. Of course, what scripture does with the language of lament is to name and unload in our plea before God the burdens that we are carrying. In that cry the people remember their trust in a God who has always chosen to be at work with them amid the brokenness. We hear this in the cry of the Psalmist: "how long O Lord?" and Jesus' cry from the cross: "my God, why have thou forsaken me?" and the grief of the women at the tomb: "they have taken my Lord and I don't know where they've put him." Throughout scripture the lament is offered, but the story never ends there. Instead, this plea lays the groundwork for the faithful to turn attentively back to God and remember that they are not on this journey alone even when they feel most brittle.

An article that I was reading spoke of N.T. Wright focusing on Romans 8:28: "all things work together for good to those who love God." But he highlighted the Greek word *synergeo* as God working with humanity rather than unilaterally for humanity. He suggests that we might translate that same verse: "God works all things toward ultimate good *with and through* those who love him." (Christian Century, Oct. 21, 2020, pg. 31) When we find ourselves feeling most distant from God, we are reminded that God is right there and together we can find a way forward.

We are nearing All Saints Day when we celebrate those who have gone before us. Many of these examples of faith shine brightest in the ways that they persevered amid struggle. I often recall the witness of those who shaped our local congregation through their faithful living. The most powerful among them were not those who just did everything by themselves, but rather those who partnered with God and with those around them to trust that there was a way forward when others were unconvinced. Our journey of faith almost always requires us to travel beyond where we can see, believing that God travels with us. It is hard in this moment of time to see clearly how God is calling us to care for one another and all of creation. We are surrounded by anxieties and fears that are exacerbated by all that the news has to offer: pandemics, elections, economic woes, and civil rights struggles. While the world seems addicted to the fear and anxiety... our faith offers a different path. Perhaps just after we let out the plea to God about all that is burdening us, we need to look around and discern all the people and opportunities around us. And then, with the love of God and one another as our guide, we move forward trusting that God is working with us and through us.

The months ahead are going to continue to be strange and trying. Holidays will hold a different character than they have in the past. Our world will continue to ride a roller-coaster on which we are not in control. But together, together, we can be the blessing that we seek. I pray for God's shalom, that deep peace with all of creation, for each of us!

Youth Ministry Intern Position

PURPOSE

For the intern, this is an opportunity to gain practical ministry experience, to work in an atmosphere of personal and professional guidance and support, to test their gifts and call to vocational ministry, and to develop spiritually and theologically. For the church, the intern brings practical help and energy to the youth ministry, provides additional relational ministry to the youth of our congregation and provides a role model to the youth of this church.

ACCOUNTABLE TO

The youth intern will be accountable to the Pastor, Personnel Committee, Faith Formation Coordinator, and the Christian Education Committee (CE).

INTERNSHIP DESCRIPTION

• The overall objective is to present and show by example the gospel of Jesus Christ to young people and to encourage them in their growth through the study of scripture, prayer, service, and fellowship.

Specific activities may include:

- Plan and carry out activities with youth, including opportunities for urban outreach and ministry.
- Develop relationships with youth, parents and volunteer staff through individual and group contact, mail, e-mail, phone, social media and in the community.
- Meet regularly with both the Ministry and CE teams for planning, communication and evaluation.
- Assist the CE committee in planning and executing ministry programs. These may include Bible studies, youth groups, special events, retreats, urban projects and travel ministries.
- Lead youth meetings.
- Maintain personal, spiritual and professional growth.

QUALIFICATIONS

- Growing commitment to the Christian faith, the body of Christ, and God's work in the world.
- Ability to work effectively with youth, exhibiting creativity, understanding and patience.
- Ability to verbally articulate personal faith and a Christian world view.

TIME and TRAVEL COMMITMENT

The internship will require approximately 10 hours per week, which will be on a flexible schedule.
