From the Pastor's Study • October 2020

I was talking with my wise-sage wife recently and she told me that we all need to hear a word that is more hopeful and lighter – enough of all of the news of the world. She reminded me of a post that someone had offered about one of our favorite National Parks, Zion. The observer said something like "you need to be willing to see beauty differently to fully appreciate Zion." I think that the idea was that if you are looking for lush green landscapes, or startling geysers, or soaring glacier clad mountains, you are going to encounter something radically different. The beauty is in layers of rock, and how myriad colors of red stone interact. The beauty is the power of a little water running through a slot canyon or a moment where you feel like you are observing a moonscape. I have always cherished those moments when we are challenged to see with new eyes. As a college student I remember an art teacher who gave us the challenge to carefully study a one-centimeter square on any object that we chose. We were then to take that tiny little bit of our world, and paint or draw it as an image not smaller than a couple of feet square. Suddenly a flake of oatmeal, or a tiny spot on a rock, or a tiny portion of your hand, became the source of seeing the world through new eyes. Any time that we are forced to change our perspective we have the opportunity to see and learn new things.

I cherish a journey of faith that regularly offers just this kind of reframing of what we think that we see and what we think that we know. Whether that is an observation that cuts through thousands of years' of assumptions about a text, or something as a simple as being awakened to how the translation of a word always carries with it the theology of the translator, it can expand our relationship with God and our faith. This last spring, I encountered an article that challenged something as simple as the name change that we all have learned forever as Saul became Paul. The scholar cited the textual evidence to point out that considering the name change as an expression of a change of religious perspective did not fit with the Biblical canon. This scholar looked at long-held assumptions through new eyes, eyes that perhaps because of some "aha" moment allowed them to ask questions about the Biblical story. In this instance the scholar noted that Paul lived in a bi-cultural world, a world that many people still navigate every day. Within Jewish society he used the Jewish name Saul, within Roman society he used his Roman name Paul... The simple observation invites us to see Saul/Paul through a different lens and to further remember that he was someone who had spent his whole life navigating the intersection of conflicting cultures and religions. It is an interesting observation that will have me pay different attention to something a simple as a name.

We live our faith in world that is always changing and that offers both challenges and blessings. We are called by God to engage both. We are encouraged to learn how to see with eyes of faith. This week anyone who has looked at the setting sun has been stunned by the extraordinary beauty of the brilliant orange-red globe hanging in the sky. Its beauty should take our breath away, but the reminder that this vision has been caused by all of the smoke that is travelling from the massive fires in the west should humble us to remember how our world and our lives are always interconnected with others. Both of those observations are calls to faith. God constantly demands that we cherish life, that we celebrate blessings, and that we be servants of love seeking justice and wholeness for all people.

We are living in unusual times. Much of what we have been accustomed to in our world has been altered in large and small ways in the last months. Certainly, for us not being gathered in our church building has been a bold expression of a changed reality. Each of those changes is also an opportunity to refocus our ways of seeing, to take a deep breath and center our souls, and then to consider what wonder God might be offering in this moment.

May we all take the time to be touched by the blessings before us. May we all be bold in sharing the glimpses of grace with one another and the world.

It has been wonderful having a chance to see familiar faces (or at least eyeballs) of many who have been joining us for worship in the park over the last months. We are all hungry, even longing, for the ability to be regathered with our church family. The Regathering Committee has been meeting and talking about how to make this possible as the seasons change. We are excited about trying to regather as a church family, and we are excited about the opportunity that it may offer for all of us to share our care for one another in ways that we never could have imagined (and ways that may not feel like the warm-fuzzy care with which we are accustomed). The love that we share with one another is going to make lots of our interactions at church look very different at this time. We are going to need to practice a deep covenantal faith, where we understand that God has always asked us to put our neighbor's need as equal to ours, and God has consistently required that we take special care for those who are most vulnerable. We are called to shepherd God's sheep and offer them good pasture and care... even if they are resistant. My prayer is that each of the changes that we encounter, we can see as an invitation to love. Many of the area churches reopened some time ago, each of us has been required or encouraged to follow the guidance of our own denominations and our wider church partners (The Council of Churches). The guiding principle for the UCC has been discerning how to faithfully follow Jesus' commands to love God and to love our neighbor as ourselves. Jesus teaches that these two commands are equal, those relationships equal. And in this moment the love of our neighbor has also meant trying to care for our neighbor's physical health alongside of their emotional and spiritual health. As time stretches on, we keep seeking to discern how to balance these competing interests. I encourage us to embrace each requirement as a chance to love our neighbor as much as we love our God and ourselves. We may chaff a little at some of this guidance, but we have never been told that faithful love is easy. The journey before us has always invited us into growth and deeper relationships, let us have our regathering nurture the same.

We ask that everyone wishing to regather in person covenant together to follow these requirements:

- Masks covering the mouth and nose are required.
 - o Masks can be shifted momentarily to receive communion.
 - o Masks are to be worn the entire time that you are inside the church building.
 - Masks are not required for children under two years of age.
 - o If you are unable or unwilling to wear a mask, then out of your love for your neighbor, we ask that you continue to worship with us online at this time.
- Social Distancing is required please sit with those within your "bubble" but maintain a distance of <u>at least 6 feet</u> from others who are not a part of your "bubble" at all times.
 - We will not exceed the capacity guidelines recommended by the Washington County Health Department (at this time this will limit our capacity to no more than 50 people).
- There will be no congregational or choral singing for the foreseeable future.
 - We will explore other ways to engage in the tradition of hymnody: reading hymns as poetry, humming along to a stanza of a hymn, having the worship team present hymns in person or via recordings... we are still working on the details.
- We will provide single use church bulletins, please take them with you or dispose of them after service. All the books have been removed from the sanctuary pews.

- There will be no physical sign of peace or greeting lines at this time.
- There will be no fellowship time and you are asked not to linger to converse within the confines of the building. Please do not cluster around the entrances outside.
- We will be live-streaming our worship services to YouTube and Facebook Barring the unforeseen, they will be posted at 8:00 on Sunday morning and then available thereafter.
- Sunday school will be held virtually until you hear otherwise. The Faith Formation team has prepared materials to facilitate our youths' participation in virtual Sunday School. Please see the update in this Tidings or contact the church office if you need more info.
- Small groups will be regathering at church for meetings and classes following the same guidelines outlined above.
- We ask that you sanitize your hands upon entering and exiting the building.
- If you have been physically present in the building and test positive for Covid19, you promise to let the church office know so that we can anonymously (unless you tell us otherwise) inform everyone who was present with us that they have had a potential exposure. This is a part of covenanting together as a faithful community.
- If you have any Covid19 symptoms, you will stay home. (please err on the side of caution even if you think that you may have seasonal allergies or a cold).

Undoubtedly things will continue to evolve as we regather. We will continue doing all that we can to follow Jesus' command to "love our neighbor as ourselves." Keeping everyone as safe as reasonably possible is a part of being a nurturing, loving, and safe environment physically and emotionally – that will only be possible if everyone is willing to do their part.

Please stay tuned and expect that details may continue to change at any time.

Worship in the Park

Sundays October 4, and 11 worship will be held at River Hill Park in Kewaskum. (1150 Parkview Dr.) There will be two services: 8:00 and 9:30 a.m. Social Distancing Guidelines:

- Please conduct a self-check and stay home if you or a household member have symptoms of COVID-19 (Symptoms can include fever, cough, shortness of breath, chills, headache, muscle pain, sore throat, or loss of taste or smell. Other less common symptoms include gastrointestinal symptoms like nausea, vomiting, or diarrhea).
- If you or a household member are at higher risk for severe illness you are <u>strongly</u> encouraged to stay home.
- Please wear a face covering or mask that covers BOTH your nose and mouth.
 After you are seated if you aren't speaking or singing you may remove your mask.
- Please maintain a 6 feet distance from people who are not a part of your household – even if you are wearing a face covering or mask.
- We ask that you refrain from singing, or only sing quietly from behind your mask.
 Singing is a higher-risk activity, as it more forcefully expels respiratory droplets than speaking.
- · Please bring your own lawn chairs.
- Please bring your own hand sanitizer.

Q: How are we offering Sunday School and Confirmation in a time of virtual instruction...?

A: I'm so glad you asked... here's the October update!

Pastor Eric is meeting with 9th Grade Confirmation students on Wednesday afternoons, while practicing social distancing and safety protocol.

Eric Walker and the 7th and 8th Grade Confirmation students meet virtually via zoom calls on Sunday evening, using the re:form Ancestors Old Testament curriculum. They recently discussed the Hebrew words "Adamah" and "Chavah" while studying the creation stories in Genesis.

5th and 6th Grade Sunday School students meet via zoom with John Lemke after worship on Sunday mornings using the Submerge curriculum. Students are investigating the ancestors of Jesus, as well as their own ancestors, and the impact they have had on the students' lives.

Youth Ministry Intern Position

PURPOSE

For the intern, this is an opportunity to gain practical ministry experience, to work in an atmosphere of personal and professional guidance and support, to test their gifts and call to vocational ministry, and to develop spiritually and theologically. For the church, the intern brings practical help and energy to the youth ministry, provides additional relational ministry to the youth of our congregation and provides a role model to the youth of this church.

ACCOUNTABLE TO

The youth intern will be accountable to the Pastor, Personnel Committee, Faith Formation Coordinator, and the Christian Education Committee (CE).

INTERNSHIP DESCRIPTION

• The overall objective is to present and show by example the gospel of Jesus Christ to young people and to encourage them in their growth through the study of scripture, prayer, service, and fellowship.

Specific activities may include:

- Plan and carry out activities with youth, including opportunities for urban outreach and ministry.
- Develop relationships with youth, parents and volunteer staff through individual and group contact, mail, e-mail, phone, social media and in the community.
- Meet regularly with both the Ministry and CE teams for planning, communication and evaluation.
- Assist the CE committee in planning and executing ministry programs. These may include Bible studies, youth groups, special events, retreats, urban projects and travel ministries.
- Lead youth meetings.
- Maintain personal, spiritual and professional growth.

QUALIFICATIONS

- Growing commitment to the Christian faith, the body of Christ, and God's work in the world.
- Ability to work effectively with youth, exhibiting creativity, understanding and patience.
- Ability to verbally articulate personal faith and a Christian world view.

TIME and TRAVEL COMMITMENT

The internship will require approximately 10 hours per week, which will be on a flexible schedule.

Coronavirus Disease (COVID-19) How to Protect Yourself & Others

From the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) – July 31, 2020

Know how it spreads

- There is currently no vaccine to prevent coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19).
- The best way to prevent illness is to avoid being exposed to this virus.
- The virus is thought to spread mainly from person-to-person.
 - o Between people who are in close contact with one another (within about 6 feet).
 - Through respiratory droplets produced when an infected person coughs, sneezes or talks.
 - These droplets can land in the mouths or noses of people who are nearby or possibly be inhaled into the lungs.
 - Some recent studies have suggested that COVID-19 may be spread by people who are not showing symptoms.

Everyone Should

Wash your hands often

- Wash your hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds especially after you have been in a public place, or after blowing your nose, coughing, or sneezing.
- It's especially important to wash:
 - Before eating or preparing food
 - o Before touching your face
 - After using the restroom
 - o After leaving a public place
 - o After blowing your nose, coughing, or sneezing
 - After handling your mask
 - o After changing a diaper
 - After caring for someone sick
 - o After touching animals or pets
- If soap and water are not readily available, use a hand sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol. Cover all surfaces of your hands and rub them together until they feel dry.
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth with unwashed hands.

Avoid close contact

- Inside your home: Avoid close contact with people who are sick.
 - If possible, maintain 6 feet between the person who is sick and other household members.
- **Outside your home:** Put 6 feet of distance between yourself and people who don't live in your household.
 - o Remember that some people without symptoms may be able to spread virus.
 - Stay at least 6 feet (about 2 arms' length) from other people.

 Keeping distance from others is especially important for people who are at higher risk of getting very sick.

Cover your mouth and nose with a mask when around others

- You could spread COVID-19 to others even if you do not feel sick.
- The mask is meant to protect other people in case you are infected.
- Everyone should wear a mask in public settings and when around people who don't live in your household, especially when other social distancing measures are difficult to maintain.
 - Masks should not be placed on young children under age 2, anyone who has trouble breathing, or is unconscious, incapacitated or otherwise unable to remove the mask without assistance.
- Do NOT use a mask meant for a healthcare worker. Currently, surgical masks and N95 respirators are critical supplies that should be reserved for healthcare workers and other first responders.
- Continue to keep about 6 feet between yourself and others. The mask is not a substitute for social distancing.

Cover coughs and sneezes

- **Always cover your mouth and nose** with a tissue when you cough or sneeze or use the inside of your elbow and do not spit.
- Throw used tissues in the trash.
- Immediately **wash your hands** with soap and water for at least 20 seconds. If soap and water are not readily available, clean your hands with a hand sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol.

Clean and disinfect

- Clean AND disinfect frequently touched surfaces daily. This includes tables, doorknobs, light switches, countertops, handles, desks, phones, keyboards, toilets, faucets, and sinks.
- If surfaces are dirty, clean them. Use detergent or soap and water prior to disinfection.
- Then, use a household disinfectant.

Monitor Your Health Daily

- **Be alert for symptoms.** Watch for fever, cough, shortness of breath, or other symptoms of COVID-19.
 - Especially important if you are running essential errands, going into the office or workplace, and in settings where it may be difficult to keep a physical distance of 6 feet.

Peace Church Friends and Congregation,

It has been a remarkably busy and tumultuous year for growing. Yes, I said growing. I believe that Covid-19 has brought on many challenges to how we all live. I would like to bring to your attention some of the positives that we may not have noticed. First, the virtual capabilities of our church have grown by leaps and bounds. The new sound equipment is currently in the process of being installed as I write this letter. In combination with that, our video capturing capabilities are also in the process of being installed. What does this mean? Our church services will now be shared to more members than before. Many of you have already been able to stay at home and watch either a recorded or now live streaming service. Shut-ins, people traveling south for the winter, or some of our young people that may have to work weekends can still see our church services. In the past, if something kept you from church service you would miss it.

Many of our groups that gather in-person are now using Zoom to meet. The consistory has adopted a practice of using both live and Zoom for their meetings. This takes some of the pressure off our consistory members who may have struggled to attend in-person, as they can now simply log-in live from home. Covid-19 may have kept us apart physically, but I think in some ways we have closed the distance between us with the innovative technology.

Part of the growing has also been the people at Peace Church who have adapted and stepped up to the challenges we have all faced. I would be remiss if I did not say a BIG THANK YOU to all of them. Pastor Eric and the worship team have been incredible with keeping services on-going. The music team (Karla, Sherry, Elsa, Berit, Maëlle, Bill, Lauren, and Elena) that was able to perform not only in an empty church but outside in the park, truly showed what members of our church are capable of. The consistory unanimously voted to make sure that our church staff was taken care of during the crisis. The Christian Education team switched from in-person to virtual within a few weeks and delivered Sunday school materials to our church families. Robin is making sure that all the office responsibilities are managed with the new normal. Pastor Bob, Gayle, Pastor Eric's family (Laura, Elsa, Berit, and their French exchange daughter, Maëlle Leopardo), Dan and Roger (the church custodian and sexton) Sandi Radeztsky and Diane Stangl, for their organizing and mailing out greeting cards to some of our church members, and Bob Schrader, who visited church members homes to record video message that have been included in Sunday worship services , are only some of the people that have stepped up.

Some of the other new items for this last year are the mission statement, the ongoing search for a youth leader, a group of engaged members that have participated in the Damascus project around stewardship. The kitchen remodel has been slow going with the challenges around the Covid-19 situation. This committee will begin to move forward again now that we are starting to meet in person again.

Our people are what makes our church what it is, but finances are what keeps the building open. Even though the church was not holding in church services our mission continued. The general fund has continued to show a negative budget balance. This year the church applied for a Payroll Protection Loan that we received to help offset some of those costs related to payroll during the Covid-19 crisis. This amount will only offset about one half of the general fund's negative budget balance. Two areas to help improve the stewardship of our church around funding the general fund are to increase the amount of

engagement from some of our members who may not be engaged and second continue the support of our church by our members who are engaged.

The pre-Covid-19 general fund deficit was \$24,000. This may seem like an insurmountable mountain to climb, but every journey starts with one step: We currently have 310 giving contributors to our church over the last 12 months. If each one of those contributors were to give just \$77.42 more per year, we would overcome our deficit. We know that for some that would be a hardship, and for some they might be able to do more. But we know that every little expression of our faith when shared makes the mountain much easier to climb. I want to thank all the contributors for their stewardship to help support our church and its missions so far. What can we do around our stewardship for the church moving forward? Is it volunteering to fill a consistory position, financial giving, serving on a committee, helping run the new audio/visual equipment, teaching Sunday school, or some other new way of serving?

As always, I am open to hearing your thoughts. It has been and will continue to be an honor to serve the congregation of Peace United Church Christ.

Call to Order- John A Lemke Jr called the meeting to order at 10:45am

Gathering Prayer- Prayer offered by Rev Eric Kirkegaard

Approval of Agenda- Motion made by Judy Christensen to approve agenda, second by John Wood and motion carried.

Approval of Minutes- October 21st, 2018- A motion to accept the 2018 Annual Congregational meeting was made by John Wood, second by Bill Stangl and carried.

Pastor's Report- Rev Eric began by reminding us this is his 21st year as Pastor at Peace UCC. The past year saw three major mission trips that included Habitat and the Canada Canoe trip. The VBS program was a huge success with a large number of students participating this year. Rev Eric acknowledged the expanse of ministries offered at Peace UCC from Gayle VanEss and her energetic work and inspiration to Christian Education, Pastor Bob and his continued commitment to the visitation ministry program, Diane Swanson and her faithful service that was offered to our church for the past 27 years and the celebration of Robin Mock coming on board to take on a new role for our Church as Office Manager. As Robin's role takes over, Kathy Danielson will be departing her paid position and Rev Eric offered praises for the extraordinary ministry Kathy has offered the congregation over the years and continues to do so.

Rev Eric discussed the needs of the Church to fill vacant boards, ushering and other offering of ways to serve the Church family.

Rev Eric offered appreciation for the following members of consistory who will be ending their services at the end of the year: Cal Rauch, Eric Walker, Shirley Miller and Don Neitzel.

President's Report- John A Lemke discussed the letter he presented as part of the Annual Congregational meeting which discusses the formation of a Vision statement for the Church.

There is continuing work to complete a Mission statement to give direction to where the congregation is moving towards.

Sound System replacement continues to be a priority as many of the material products have been purchased and we continue on working towards the installation.
