Greetings - Prayer Requests – A Time of Centering

April 22nd at sunset our Jewish brothers and sisters will begin the seven days of the Passover holiday. They will gather to remember the story of God's salvation that has been handed down through the generations. Our gospels share with us a different story of how Jesus gathered with his disciples in that Upper Room to celebrate the same story of salvation. The Passover Seder that Jesus celebrated in the first century is not necessarily reflected in the rabbinic sources that emerge almost two centuries later.

This evening, we incorporate a portion of the modern Passover Seder liturgy as we recall the stories and consider how they connect to the central message of Jesus' meal with his disciples in that upper room.

*Tonight, we will begin our worship with the first half of “Holden Evening Prayer.” This is a service of song and prayer in which all present are participants. Please join in singing wherever “**all**” is written in the music.*

Service of Light through Singing of the Psalm (pg. 2 to pg.8)

One: Barukh attah Adonai Elohaynu melekh ha-olam...

Praise to You, Adonai, our God - Sovereign of the Universe, who has kept us alive and sustained us and allowed us to reach this season.

We pray:

May all who are enslaved throughout the world, come to know freedom. May all who are free, appreciate the blessings of abundance. And may all of us dwell in the house of God and give thanks for our good fortune as we remember the Passover.

Hebrew Bible Exodus 12:1-6, 11-14

Recalling the Story (*Maggid*): from “*A Brief Seder*”

The central part of the Passover Seder is the telling of the story. It begins with the words: We were slaves to Pharaoh in Egypt. But the Lord our God took us out from there with a mighty hand and an out-stretched arm.

Come and hear the story of our people, the story we relive on Seder night.

How our ancestors went forth from the straits of Egypt (*Mitzrayim*) to the open places of rejoicing and faith.

This story belongs to you and me. An age-old story, it becomes our own when we tell it on Seder night.

A wandering Aramean was my father. He went down to Egypt few in number. There he became a great nation, mighty and numerous. (*Deut. 26:5*)

In Egypt we discovered our distinctiveness. Few in number, we learned that greatness is more than numbers.

“The Egyptians treated us harshly and oppressed us, they imposed hard labor on us.” (*Deut. 26:6*)

Their harshness wounded us with false accusations, with venom and hate and distrust.

We cried out to Adonai, the God of our ancestors, He heard our voice and saw our affliction, our toil and our oppression.”

What did Adonai see in Egypt?

He saw families torn asunder, and children made to suffer. God saw the cruelty of Egypt and the helplessness of Israel.

“So, Adonai brought us out of Egypt with a mighty hand, with an out-stretched arm, with awe and signs and wonders.” (*Deut. 26:8*)

Egypt and Israel felt God's presence in every corner of the land. His signs filled the earth and the sky, his wonders could be seen in every Israelite's eye.

With a mighty hand he demanded justice for the oppressed. With plagues and wonders he taught the Egyptians the lesson of his power.

Together, we remember the 10 plagues: **blood**, frogs, **fleas**, wild animals, **pestilence**, boils, **hail**, locusts, **darkness**, the killing of the firstborn.

While we celebrate the freeing of the Israelites from slavery, God has instructed us to take no pleasure in the suffering of the Egyptians.

So may God's signs be present today to teach us of Your justice and Your mighty acts.

Dayenu! (it would have been enough, and we are grateful)
We rejoice in our deliverance by saying *Dayenu*.
Had God done only a little bit for us, it would have been enough! We join in proclaiming *Dayenu!* (please join in singing!)

If God had taken us out of Egypt,
It would have been enough!

If God had brought us to Mount Sinai but not given us the Torah,

it would have been enough!

If God had given us the Torah but not brought us into the land of Israel,

it would have been enough!

If God had brought us into the land of Israel but not allowed us to build the Temple,

it would have been enough!
